Preate in me a clean heart, O'God Anacortes Lutheran Church February 2021 Newsletter

I suspect some of the most difficult words to say and really mean are "I'm sorry." To admit fault and to turn to the other for some kind of absolution is not an easy thing to do. It not only hurts our egos, but it also forces us to admit our culpabilities and flaws. Even Elton John acknowledges this with his song Sorry Seems to be the Hardest Thing.

My kids when they were young could throw around the "I'm sorry" phrase with ease. If my wife or I would question them about some childish violation they would quickly respond "Sorry" as they went on to do something else. In fact, my daughter had a vocal inflection common to many teens and pre-teens which made it clear the word was just for the appeasement of her parents and further indicating we were the ones who should be sorry for even questioning her. Maybe you're familiar with that inflection and its meaningless nature. I'm sure I've used the "Sorry" word many times and never really meant it.

Realizing our faults and seeking forgiveness are just not things we like to do.

This month we move into the season of Lent, and, of course, that season begins with Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is the most penitential day of the church year. We make a lengthy confession of sin. We then hear a statement which emphasizes the mercy of God, but it doesn't pronounce the full absolution; that absolution will not be received until Maundy Thursday.

We also receive the imposition of ashes upon our foreheads. Ashes in Israel were a sign of deep penitence. They are also a reminder of our mortality, emphasized by the words, "You are dust, and unto dust you shall return."

Sin and death; certainly not the topics we readily share with friends. They are two aspects of human existence which scare the bejeebers out of us. Yet they are at the forefront of the Ash Wednesday observance.

However there is a reason we can speak of both our faults and our mortality. We have a God whose mercy and love are powerful enough to answer our worst characteristics and flaws. Without such an assurance it would be far more painful to address the darker side of our existence.

This year's Ash Wednesday service will be virtual, but we will also offer a drive-through imposition for those who wish. More information on this will be forthcoming.

With confidence in God's grace through Jesus Christ we enter are bold enough to be honest not only with this community of faith and with our God, we are also honest with ourselves.

"I'm sorry" can be heartfelt and sincere. It awaits forgiveness in order to be healed and whole. We, as God's people, will admit our brokenness and place ourselves in the hands of God. We do so knowing we have already been answered.





Masks: The New Way of Life?

The New Year: 2020 - and then came Covid-19.

A Pandemic! Panic struck with all sorts of questions! What do we do? How do we stay safe? How do we protect ourselves?

Guidelines were put into place: Wear a mask....Social Distance (what's that?)....Wash your hands/use hand sanitizer! The World was not prepared. Within weeks there was a shortage of masks, hospital isolation gowns, ventilators.

In March, a request came to me from Fidalgo Rehab for masks......could we make 200? That sounded like a LOT! But the word went out. 30+ women in Anacortes joined me and we worked fast to fulfill the original request, plus 120 isolation gowns! And the requests kept coming- from all over Anacortes...... and we kept sewing!

By the Fall, we had distributed over 3400 masks, to every Care Facility, the Family Shelter, the Anacortes Police, Fire Department, City and some local restaurants and businesses. Two other groups in town supplied masks to Island Hospital and other needs. Along with them, we are now working on 300 masks for Mt. Erie Elementary School for their re-entry to the classrooms. My group also sewed Purple masks to go to the High School when they reopen. And so - we keep sewing! Days for Girls International stepped up to the plate with "Masks for Millions", changing our focus from reusable sanitation hygiene supplies (which we could not distribute with Covid) to Masks - Worldwide.

We ask: is this the "New Normal" for us? Hopefully not forever, but for now Covid is still raging, and we still need to follow the Guidelines for our safety, and the safety of others.

SO! Wear Your Mask! Keep 6' Social Distancing! Wash/Sanitize Your Hands!

I know we are all frustrated, perhaps lonely, and need hugs, but please be patient! God is in Control, and This too shall pass.

ALC will be having a "Drive Through Imposition of Ashes" at two different times on Ash Wednesday Feb17. 

Meeting to order at 6:30pm and Kendra said a prayer.

December 11th mtg notes approved as written.

Treasurers Report: Dec revenue to expense \$1,814. Year to date member offering is \$284,262, averaging \$5,685 weekly YTD. Year to date revenue to expense is \$9,702. The Christmas Benevolence was paid to: Lutherwood to \$1,500, Anacortes Family Center \$1,500, Salvation Food Bank and Helping Hands Food Bank each \$1,000. Benevolence paid final quarter is \$3,500 and bills are current. Benevolences paid YTD is \$30,113. Christmas dinner donations \$2,402, we will hold extra for next year. Christmas offering \$5,455. We rec'd from Betty Wright's Estate \$25,000 to be ear marked for Preschool Scholarships. We will save out \$10,000 for this year scholarships. Lane made **Motion** to hold the balance of \$15,000 in Mission Investments for disbursement next year. Discussion **MSP** We had an anonymous donation of an 1881 Silver Dollar to be used for someone that needs help. We will look into value and go from there. Accepted report as given.

Bishops Message - The Spirit February 2021

Dear Beloveds,

There were many images that horrified me during the Washington DC riots. The violence, cruelty, anger, and destruction were terrible.

One image that made me both angry and almost nauseous was the photograph of the person holding up a bright yellow sign with the words, "Jesus Saves." To be clear, it is not that I object to these words. I strongly believe that Jesus saves. But in this particular case, when one holds up a sign bearing these beautiful words but participating in mob violence, it becomes a mockery. Horrifically, there were other Christian symbols present that day. There was a giant wooden cross outside the Capitol. One man carried a Christian flag into an evacuated legislative chamber. Christian music blared all day from loudspeakers. It was disgusting to see sacred words and items suddenly used to foment violence. It was sickening, reckless, and horrifying. It was profane. The insurrection on the Capitol broke the first, second, fifth, seventh, eighth, ninth, and tenth commandments. Any action that breaks one commandment is wrong. An action that breaks the majority of the commandments is beyond alarming. (And I could actually make an argument that this insurrection also broke the third and fourth commandments, too. This only leaves the sixth unbroken.)

In the ELCA social message on Government and Civic Engagement in the United States: Discipleship in a Democracy we read, ELCA social teaching holds that all residents of the United States have a responsibility to make government function well—not to abandon our democracy but to engage it in a spirit of robust civic duty. For Lutherans, this responsibility is lived out as a calling from God, expressed in the discipleship described in our baptismal promises. (Read the full message here: www.elca.org/Faith/Faith-and-Society/Social-Messages/Government.)

This social message states that as residents of the United States and as followers of Jesus, we all have a responsibility for government to function well. We are called to be a part of civic society. We are called to vote. We are called to be civil servants. We are called to speak out against injustice. We are called to march against hatred. We are called to peacefully protest when those in power act in ways that promote prejudice or bigotry or discrimination. We are called to speak truth. For those of us with privilege, we are especially called to examine ourselves, to listen to others, and to speak for those without voice. We are called to act in ways where God's love is paramount – moving towards true peace, true equity, and true reconciliation. In short, we are called to live into our baptismal identity of forgiven and beloved children of God by loving and caring for God, our neighbor, and our world.

I encourage congregations and ministry sites to study the social message mentioned above. There are also other social messages and social statements found on the ELCA website to further conversation and action as we continue to learn how to be disciples of Jesus by engaging in the world. Perhaps this could be something that you and others do during Lent. But please don't stop at reading, studying, and talking about it. Let us move forward with action. Our faith calls us to stand next to the oppressed and forgotten in faith, knowing that, as we are loved by God, we are called to love our neighbor.

I am appalled at what happened on January 6, 2021. As a citizen of the United States and, even more so, as a Christian, I am devastated. But I have hope. I have hope that out of this hatred, love will emerge. I have hope that those who have been fearful will gain courage. I have hope that we, siblings, beloveds in Christ, will join together and reclaim the words, "Jesus saves." I have hope that we as a nation will form a more perfect union. I have hope – not because I'm an idealist but because I'm a follower of Jesus – that out of this death resurrection will come.
