

MESSAGE FROM PASTOR WALT

During a conversation with Dr. Fred Niedner, the then chair of the school of theology at Valparaiso University, he shared an observation which I think is worth reflection. He suggested along with the so-called "basic necessities" of life (food, shelter, clothing, oxygen, etc.) there might be one more need human beings can hardly do without, namely the need to be right.

Since that conversation of many years ago I've often considered the truth of that, usually when I'm examining my own life and habits, and I've decided it is probably true. I don't like to be wrong or for someone else to suggest I'm wrong. That especially applies to my major beliefs. Whether it's politics, morality, or even my faith, I don't want to be questioned.

You might tell me I was mistaken about a football score, and I can begrudgingly admit my error. You can announce I left the thyme out of a recipe, and I'll simply be a little embarrassed. But don't' you dare suggest I've supported the wrong candidate or that I need to rethink some of my long-held values or that I might envision God in another way. My temperature will rise, my face will take on an angered look, and I will prepare to go to war with you. I don't want to be wrong.

However, when I finally encounter my Lord upon entry into the Church Triumphant, I just might discover I was terribly mistaken about some aspect of my theology or beliefs; there might be something I was absolutely positive I knew better than others which requires correcting. I hope (this being heaven and all) that I will be enlightened and able to admit I was wrong.

The wonderful thing about our God is that we live in grace. God doesn't expect us to totally understand the divine will; we are not required to check off our beliefs on a long list of true or false questions. Rather we are simply called to follow Jesus and to bask in forgiveness and love.

Some folks believe doubts are the opposite of faith. However, doubt is really the flip of the same coin. Our faith grows when we constantly re-examine new ways in which God might be at work in our world. And we are completely free to do so.

One passage of scripture which has always caused me to pause and ponder is Mark 9:24, a quote from a father desperately beseeching Jesus' aid on behalf of his sick son. The man responds to the Christ saying, "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief." It's a prayer worth praying.

When it comes to faith, I don't need to always be right; grace covers my shortcomings and failures. So, we pray to our God for a faith which trusts, and we follow Jesus wherever he leads. I know I'm right on that one.

ALC COUNCIL MINUTES - July 8, 2021

Attendees: Bill LeDuc, President; Peggy White, Outreach; Jeaneen Brogan, Personnel; Les Olsen, Property; Jeanette Christiensen, Welca; John Parker, Stewardship; Pastor Walt Rice

Meeting convened: 07/08/2021 @ 6:30 PM Meeting opened with prayer led by Les Olsen.

The minutes of the previous meeting were unanimously accepted as submitted.

President's Report:

Jane Nelson has submitted her resignation as Council Secretary, effective 7/7/21. Temporary minutes takers will be recruited until a replacement can be found.

Treasurers Report:

Submitted in-absentia by Lane Phelan, was read by Council President, LeDuc. Treasurer reports that we are approximately \$1000 ahead Revenue vs Expense YTD, however that is primarily due to receiving 4 annual gifts as one-time, lump sum donations, and that for the balance of the year she expects us to be \$5000/month short. We have reserves sufficient to make up the shortfall, but the Treasurer's committee recommended the financial secretary, Linda Millo, be instructed to prepare and send financial statements to members. Motion to this effect was passed unanimously.

Pastor's Report:

Per Worship Committee, there will not be any communion by intinction until at least September. Non-vaccinated attendees will be offered seating in pews to accommodate social distancing and masks if they desire, but ushers will not enforce any mask mandate. Pastor requested a vacation day July 18, which Personnel approved. Pastor Butler will preside. Pastor Rice suggested we re-institute name tags as people start to come back to regular's attendance.

Property Report:

Les Olsen reported that he was in the process of investigating contracting with a new Fire Security firm as our existing firm is relocating to Tacoma, and charges mileage and hours for travel for on-site inspections. Les will be on an extended road vacation for three months beginning in about two weeks and that Paul Dusenbury has agreed to fill in while he is gone.

Education:

VBS is the main focus right now and that Dorothy Engom needs assistance in preparing the craft packages for 4 days of crafts.

Stewardship: No Report

Worship: No Report

Personnel Report:

All paid staff have signed contracts thru June 2022. There will be no raises this year. Vacation time will not be accrued for part-time nursery attendants or part-time janitors. Mirth Moore has announced her retirement from Sunday nursery duty.

Outreach Report:

Prayer requests were distributed, and Peggy White ordered 100 pocket prayer books. Outreach has arranged for volunteers to provide rides to worship and meals to sick or needing caretaking. The main focus right now is the Open House/Rally Day August 28 11:00-1:00. The purpose is to re-acquaint members after Covid and to introduce friends and neighbors to ALC. There were questions about what was included in the Outreach budget, and how to fund the Open House. A \$250 Thrvent grant may be available.

WELCA Report:

10-12 WELCA women sew every Tuesday and about 50 quilts are already done. Sewing ladies include 3-5 Celebration Lutheran members who come for the fellowship. WELCA Circles with resume in September.

New Business:

The Executive Board won't meet again until 9/2/21 at 4:30 pm.

The next Council meeting is 9/16/21 at 6:30 pm.

There being no further business, the Meeting was adjourned and closed with the Lord's Prayer and 7:45 PM

BISHOPS MESSAGE - The Spirit August 2021 + Bishop Shelley Bryan Wee

My dining room table has been my office for sixteen months. Right now, as I look at the surface I see my computer, a picture of my kids, my phone, a coffee cup, two glasses filled halfway with water, my notebook, gum, sticky notes, my Bible, The Management of Policies and Procedures for Management of the Roster of the ELCA, The ELCA Constitution, various stacks of paper, some books I want to read, the ELW, my devotion book, and pushed way out of the way, at the very edge of the table, my lovely quilted table runner and candles that used to sit in the middle of the dining room table (when it wasn't being used to eat on).

If my dining room table could speak, it would say, "I am tired. I am tired of you sitting here day after day. I am tired of you making a mess on me. I am tired of not being used for what I'm supposed to be used for. I am tired."

Or maybe ... I'm projecting.

When this pandemic first hit, the synod staff and I went into emergency mode. We made plans. We sent out emails. We revised (and revised and revised) COVID-19 guidelines. Like you, we kept going and going. And we have survived. And you have survived. Together, we have survived.

And together ... we are tired.

As you might recall, Jesus also got tired. There are many verses throughout the Gospels where we read: "Jesus often withdrew to lonely places and prayed." ... "Jesus was sleeping." ... "He didn't want anyone to know which house he was staying in."

And it didn't start in the Gospels. Truly, from the beginning of time, we hear how God rested. In Genesis, God rested on the seventh day. And God understood rest not only for Godself but also for the very creatures that God created. The only thing that God calls holy in the creation account is the sabbath. When God gave Moses the Ten Commandments God specifically declared, "Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy." And this commandment was for everyone – including outsiders and animals. Fully fifteen percent of life was to be sabbath. In this commandment we hear how the sabbath is sacred for those who live in relationship with a living God – this God who rescued people from slavery in a land where no rest was allowed.

I think somewhere we forgot the rhythms that God placed on this earth. The rhythm that is in the very way that trees grow and lay dormant; how tides ebb and flow; how spring moves into summer and into fall and into winter and back to spring. While it is true that Jesus did say, "The sabbath was made for human-kind, and not humankind for the sabbath," he also said, "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest."

Sabbath is a time of rest, a time of renewal, and a time to listen for what God is up to in our lives, in our communities, and in our world. Sabbath is a time to reflect on the world without rushing to "fix it." Sabbath is not "guilt-ridden stolen time." Instead, sabbath is holy. Sabbath is sacred. Sabbath is commanded and modeled by God.

Beloveds, we are called to sabbath. We are called to sabbath even when it seems the needs of all are pressing in on us. While you – and your vocations, your desires, your gifts, your responsibilities – are important, so is understanding that the world does not revolve around your work. And, in taking sabbath, you become a better leader and servant.

Enjoy August. Take sabbath. Let others take sabbath. The world is in good hands. In the best hands. In God's hands. (And yes, I am going to clean off my dining room table. Soon.)
