As we enter November, I am reminded of how in many of the apostle Paul's letters he includes, "I give thanks for..." and then names a person or group that has walked alongside him in fulfilling the calling to ministry that Christ has given him. What is it like to live a life where 'thanksgiving' is not just something we celebrate as a holiday this month (or last month if you are in Canada), but rather as a lifestyle or practice that changes the way we see this world?

Diana Butler Bass has written a book titled "Grateful: The Transformative Power of Giving Thanks" where she explores what changes in a person's life when they begin to approach situations in life through the lens of gratitude. Weaving in the social sciences, spirituality, and community engagement, she gives credence to how gratitude can strengthen our relationship with God, our neighbors, and even with ourselves. This is a follow-up book to "Grounded: Finding God in the World, A Spiritual Revolution" and takes the work and practice of gratitude to a place that feeds our very souls.

Gratitude, giving thanks, is an activity that becomes easier the more a person practices, just like anything else requiring practice. What would the change be in ourselves, and in our wider congregation and community, if we began an intentional practice of Giving Thanks this month? When we finally approach Thanksgiving, having had many days of practice, how might our experience of that holiday differ from how we have lived it in the past. Giving thanks for the gathering of family and friends – even when we don't see things the same way – reminds us that it is love that ultimately gathers us. Giving thanks for the wiggly youth during worship reminds us of the playfulness and energy that being in God's presence should raise up in us. Giving thanks for the rain that reminds us that winter is coming and that life continues even as the darkness lingers. Giving thanks for the bread and wine that reminds us that Jesus is with us.

Let us celebrate this month as we work toward living a life of gratitude!

### **Church Council Minutes October 10, 2024**

The meeting was called to order and Dave opened with prayer. September minutes were approved as submitted.

Jeaneen made a motion to accept Janice Louie as the new Education Chair, motion was approved.

### Treasurer's Report:

Lane, John and Linda have been working to update finances in Quickbooks. Giving isn't quite as high as the approved budget, but spending is lower than budgeted, more details to come as the updates are completed.

Bill LeDuc is working on the 2025 budget; all committee chairs should have their requests in or Bill will use 2024 numbers.

Pastor's Report: A written report was submitted.

Property: A written report was submitted.

**Worship:** A written report was submitted. Bill and Diane Gusa will recruit both Communion helpers and Ushers to be sure slots are filled. Pat-Carrie will submit a 2025 budget request to Bill.

**Education:** Sunday school classes resume this Sunday, October 13. Three high-school students will teach the younger students in class following the singing. Adult teachers will be in attendance.

**Youth:** A retreat has been planned to go to Fort Casey with other youth groups. The cost is down to \$50 per student but there are always scholarships available. There was a good response to the first youth meeting.

**Preschool:** A written report was submitted. The committee will meet next Wednesday. Lane will get a budget report to Anne prior to the meeting.

**WELCA:** A written report was submitted. October 22 is the Thankoffering event. Linda Millo will be the speaker, telling us about the Christmas needs for Josephine. From the Thankofferings, \$400 will be sent to the NWSynod WELCA, \$300 to the Anacortes Family Center, \$200 to Lutherwood and \$200 to Josephine. The Quilt Blessing will take place at worship on October 13. The quilt raffle tickets will be sold again on Oct. 13 & 20 to help pay for shipping.

**Personnel:** The budget will be reviewed for any potential changes in salaries.

**Outreach:** All Saints Day is November 3. If anyone knows someone who has experienced a loss in 2024, let Dave know. There will be a brunch following worship for those people on Nov. 3.

Christmas Dinner - Anne would like all publicity ready to go before Anne leaves town on 11/13, it can go out after Thanksgiving. Don will distribute it to the Anacortes American and the Clamdigger.

**Old Business:** The kitchen refrigerator will be purchased prior to the Christmas Dinner. Laurie will apply for a Thrivent grant for the Christmas Dinner. The ovens should be cleaned before the dinner takes place.

#### **New Business:**

- Advent Dinners Dan and Kathy Khile will cook on Dec. 11 & 18. Clean-up crews are needed for those dates. Jeanette, Jeaneen, Lane and Don will cook on Dec. 4 and will apply for a Thrivent grant.
- Let's Go Together we are invited to be a part of this partnership that connects faith, civic and social service organizations to better know each other. The pledge can be \$5-\$1000 and there would be three gatherings. This will be decided on at the November Council meeting when pastor is present.
- Westminster Presbyterian Church cooks and hosts a meal each Sunday in their church. Their kitchen will be undergoing a remodel and so have asked if our kitchen and fellowship hall would be available for use. Lane made a motion to have a representative come in November to present their needs. Don or Pastor will reach out to them to request this briefing, it is unknown if they were asking for every week or if they would be traveling to other churches as well.

- The Christmas Store earns about \$1000 for the youth each year. Kendra has volunteered to run the store for 1 week only, including 2 Sundays. Requests for donations will start soon. It worked well to have volunteers drop off tables for the event.
- Jeanette made a motion that would allow Thanksgiving Benevolence to be split between the Salvation Army Food Bank and the Lutheran Disaster Response fund. All were in favor.
- Dave is currently taking donated food to the Salvation Army Food Bank. It was discussed that maybe the youth with cars would like to do that, it may serve as a school "service project".
- Legacy Endowment Fund policies were handed out to review before the November meeting for some possible changes in the verbiage.

Pat-Carrie moved to adjourn the meeting.

Our next regular council meeting will be held November 14 at 6:30 pm. Please have committee reports in to Julie no later than midnight on Tuesday, November 12.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Quilt blessing Sunday was a special time. Our boxes are now truly ready to go after receiving the prayers of the congregation.

The quilt raffle was held and Rexanne Graham was the recipient of the beautiful quilt. Over \$500 was raised to help with shipping costs. Thank you all for your support.

While shipping is a few days away yet, our numbers are pretty amazing. Quilts - 158; Baby Care kits - 308; Personal Care kits - 259; School kits - 209. But here are some even more amazing numbers. Consider what goes into each kit.

**Baby Care kits** (308): 616 lightweight cotton tee shirts, 616 sleepers, 616 receiving blankets, 1232 cloth diapers, 308 sweaters, 616 pairs of socks, 308 hand towels, 616 bars of soap, 616 diaper pins.

**School kits** (209): 836 70-page notebooks, 209 rulers, 209 pencil sharpeners, 209 scissors, 1045 pencils, 1045 ink pens, 209 boxes of crayons, 209 erasers, 209 back pack style bags.

**Personal care kits** (259): 259 bath towels, 518 bars of soap, 259 combs, 259 toothbrushes, 259 nail clippers.

### LITURGICAL ARTS COMMITTEE

Are you interested in more art in our church? With the blessing from Gunilla Wold, Altar Guild Chair, Laurie is forming a liturgical arts committee here at ALC and would love for people to join!

So far, we have three people interested – Gunilla, myself and Rachel Devine. So, what is liturgical art?

At its finest, Lutheran worship makes use of liturgical practices that have been handed down to us from the Apostolic age. The Liturgy is the rite of worship that includes centuries-old hymns, prayers, and scriptures. Broadly defined, liturgical art is any work of art that pertains in some way to the rite of Christian worship. The altar, the font, the pulpit, the cross, and every painting, window, vestment, banner, and candle—even the church itself—are potentially vehicles for conveying the truths of scripture. Liturgical artwork attempts to translate the gospel into a physical beauty that can be seen and felt—not just heard. All of these play some role in the worship service, all are created to Glorify God and to focus the worshipper on God. Simply put, liturgical art is a tool used to engage us and offers a deeper understanding of God's loving plan for us. Liturgical artwork can be a visual sermon, a parable in pictures and a source of comfort and joy. Our church is so blessed with all of our stained glass windows — did you know that the beautiful red and blue windows on the sides of our sanctuary were made by our own Ruth Backlund? Incredible gift of Liturgical Art from Ruth!

## From the Bishop:

### November 2024



Dear Beloveds,

As the election season is here – and for many, your vote has already been cast – I have been doing some reflecting on what it means to vote as a Lutheran Christian. Please know that I am not telling you who to vote for in this election. It is not for me to tell you who to vote for. I mean, after all, God is neither Republican or Democrat, or even American.

But in saying that, I am not abdicating the responsibility that we have as Lutheran Christians who live in a country where voting matters. As children of God, we are called to vote beyond our own self-interest or individuality. As people who follow Jesus, we are called towards God's vision of a just and mercy-filled world. As people who have received grace upon grace, we are called to stand against injustice, and to remind everyone that, in God's eyes, every single person is loved and beloved.

So, here are a few thoughts and questions:

1. Jesus is all about loving one's neighbor. Even when it is hard. When he is asked, "Who is my neighbor," Jesus expands his answer beyond imagination. In Jesus' stories and actions he constantly goes to those who are on the outside, those marginalized, those without status, and shows how they are loved by God – how they are, in fact, his neighbor.

As you vote: Who is your neighbor?

2. Throughout scripture, hospitality to the stranger is embraced. In the Old Testament, the command to welcome strangers is repeated 37 times. In Matthew 25:35 Jesus says, "I was a stranger and you welcomed me."

As you vote: Who is the stranger?

3. God's will and God's calling is towards equity and justice for those who have been silenced, oppressed, or harmed. As we hear in Isaiah, "Learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, and plead for the widow."

As you vote: Who are the silenced, the oppressed, the harmed?

4. The eighth commandment declares that we are called to not bear false witness against our neighbor. This, of course, means not lying about another. This means no name-calling or false accusations. But it goes beyond this. As Martin Luther tells us in his Small Catechism, we are to defend our neighbor, speak well of our neighbor, and explain everything in the kindest way.

As you vote: Who is speaking truth?

5. God created this beautiful earth and declared that we are both part of the creation and are also called to be stewards. As we read in the ELCA social statement, *Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice,* we affirm that it is God's intention for the healing and wholeness of creation.

As you vote: Who is caring for creation?

Dear Beloveds of God, there is so much more that could be written about the state of the country and what voting means. We could make this all complicated and intricate and difficult. (And to be fair, the United States sometimes feels shaky and unmoored). But truly it comes down to this: God's love is unconditional and unending. Jesus came to this earth to show, to embody, to be God's love for us and for all people. And so, knowing this, trusting this, believing this, we are called. We are called, as baptized and sent children of God, to show this love to the world. We are called to vote against hate. We are called to vote for God's love. As we hear in 1 John, *There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear ... We love because God first loved us.*
