I doubt such a restriction was the original intent of the one who drafted the sign.

Little things also mean a lot in leading the Christian life. Our contributions to the world may seem small and even insignificant. There is probably no one among us who will make breakthrough strides in addressing the pandemic, world hunger or racial divisions. However Jesus once reminded us that even providing a cup of water to one who is thirsty is a powerful demonstration of our faith and calling.

There is a piety which is often stressed during the season of Lent whereby we are encouraged to "give up something" for the 40 day period. That is a worthwhile practice and serves to remind us of our commitment as disciples and followers of Jesus. However I prefer we "take up something" for Lent this year.

What are those little things we might pursue during this season? There is probably an endless list, but allow me to suggest a few which occur to me. In these days of COVID, phone calls or letters to shut-ins could bring comfort and companionship to one lonely or isolated. And then there is the possibility of providing transportation to testing or vaccination sites for those who don't drive. Providing meals to those who are ill, giving even small donations to worthwhile charities such as those who tackle hunger or medical conditions or even one's own congregation are ways we can be stewards of all we've been given. Although the most recent opportunity has passed, shoveling snow for someone and later in the year providing lawn care for the older or infirm may be an expression of our discipleship and love. The list is as endless as our imagination.

Little things make a difference. Jesus has called us not only to great acts of faith and sacrifice, but to those smaller ways we can live out our calling. As we journey through this season, give some thought to taking up something for Lent. Acts of kindness change lives. And who knows, maybe we can continue those little things throughout the entire year.

# ALC Council Minutes – February 11, 2021

Attended Via Zoom: Bill LeDuc, Lane Phelan, Pastor Walt, Melanie Sahnow, Jeaneen Brogan, Dave Bjornson, & Kendra Kennedy.

Meeting called to order at 6:30 pm and Dave said a prayer.

January 14<sup>th</sup> mtg notes approved as written.

**Treasurers Report:** Total year end member offering is \$303,648, averaging weekly \$5,841. Total Benevolence paid \$29,963. We ended the year with net income of \$6,408 that's a weekly average of \$5841. Accepted report as given.

**Pastors Report:** Pastor is busy working with Worship for the drive through Imposition of Ashes on Ash Wednesday Feb17<sup>th</sup>, Noon -1 and 5:30-6:30. Transition Team should complete the MSP for the Congregation to vote then hopefully hand off to the Call Committee. Stewardship Drive is in the works. Question asked, impressions of available people for a new Pastor? The PNW is a destination, our church being active and financially strong, Pastor thinks many people want to live here so should have a great pool of Pastor's for this area.

**Presidents Report:** Getting everything ironed out for the Annual meeting on the 21<sup>st</sup>, Kevin Kennedy has offered help. Everyone should be getting letters today for instructions for the meeting, if not call the church office.

**Old Business:** Reopening Committee is working hard to open the church soon, Skagit County moves into Phase Two on Monday, February 15<sup>th</sup>. Waiting for a recommendation from the Opening Committee to the Executive Board and then Council for vote. Scout Sunday was last Sunday and we had Scouts in the Sanctuary for the Church Service. Approval without actual count of kids. To bring to the Congregation, Slate of Officers, Constitution, budget, vote to approve and amend Pastor's salary, approve the amended budget.

# Bishops Message - The Spirit March 2021



This is a picture of a calendar I have on my desk. The date on it is, "March 10, 2020. Yes, I am not making a mistake, the year on this calendar is 2020.

Last year, when I turned the page on this calendar, I had no idea that this date would mark the last time I had a "normal" day in my office – with my staff and I talking, sitting at our desks, crowded together, laughing, doing business – not thinking at all of masks or physically distancing or washing hands (well, hopefully we were washing our hands!).

I have kept this calendar on March 10, 2020 as a snapshot of when life changed to a new reality. Like many of you, I never dreamed that one year later we would all be planning our second Easter of COVID or having second birthdays under these strange circumstances or still not knowing for sure when we might gather together safely.

I did not anticipate the suffering so many people have undergone. The hundreds of thousands of people who have died. So many who are still suffering from the ravages of COVID. The impact of this virus has been brutal for millions of people.

While I consider myself a patient person, truth be told, I am becoming impatient. I am ready to be done with this pandemic. I am ready for the pain and anxiety of this disease to be over. I am ready for the loss of life and health of so many to stop. I am ready for this underlying feeling of anxiety and fear to end. And you? My guess is you are feeling some of the same things.

But, as we hear in many of the psalms, we don't stop at despair. As people who believe in resurrection, we don't stop at death. In this Lenten season as we move towards Easter, we proclaim that we are a people of hope, too. As I read in my devotions this morning from Psalm 147: "The Lord heals the brokenhearted, and binds up their wounds." Through community with one another, through helping those who are marginalized, through coming together in prayer and song and worship, we are healing the brokenhearted and binding up wounds.

So, let me ask you, even as we wait, what are you looking forward to? Truly, what is bringing you hope right now? What are some things that you have learned and discovered during this pandemic that you want to take forward? We know that God works through all things – how do you see God working in your life and in the life of this nation and world?

I would love to hear from you where you see God's Holy Spirit – in your congregation, in your home, in your workplace, in the world. Where are you finding hope? Where are you finding resurrection joy? You are welcome to email me at bishop@lutheransnw.org. I would love to hear from you.

In this Lenten season (a season that sometimes feels like it began last March and is still happening) we trust that we are walking the way of the Lord. God's hand is guiding us. God's love is surrounding us. And God brings us hope.

May you feel God's grace through Jesus in these days. And may we soon gather in-person again. Stay safe. Wear a mask. Wash your hands. Get a vaccine when you are eligible. And know that we are church together, even when we are physically separated.
