A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR SCOTT

Newsletter – March 2024

Is there something different you do during the season of Lent to set it apart? Historically, Lent was a season for the catechuminate to prepare for their baptism during the Easter Vigil gathering. It was a season of study, prayer, spiritual discipline, fasting, and other practices that deepened faith and faith community participation. As the practice of infant baptism became the norm, the season of Lent changed a bit. Probably the most familiar part of Lent is the act of “giving something up” and then like New Year’s Resolutions see how long we can keep it going. It is in some way a sense of ‘fasting’. Some people I have known have given up things like: Brussels sprouts, liver and onions, or even limburger cheese (I don’t know how they made it!) Some have given up things that may be a little more difficult, like: chocolate, dessert, candy, cursing, or even hamburgers. I have prided myself on giving up giving things up, but then I realized that I failed in that one from the very beginning.

Isaiah 58:6 reads, “Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke?” (NRSV) What if we spent time in Lent to work toward justice. Of course, we may have differing opinion of what that exactly means, but I do think we can agree that justice is a good thing. We work to help one another be the best we can be, to dismantle obstructions that may hinder, and to remember that we all are better off when each of us has enough. When we put our effort toward those endeavors that we are gifted for and passionate about, we create energy that is then freed for creative purposes. Life as a community in this way almost creates something like a perpetual motion machine as the community is strengthened by the energy that comes from us working together in the same direction.

Like the Isaiah text mentions, sometimes it is in “loosing” that we find the freedom to really stretch into a new reality. We “undo the thongs” that hold us back and we move forward with the love of God filling us that we may overflow that love into the world. And we move forward with each person living who they are in the community, we celebrate difference and realize that it spices up our life together. Like a patchwork quilt, all the pieces come together so that it may wrap around in an embrace of love from those who created it.

May this Lent be a time not of burden, but one of renewal in our lives of faith and our relationships with God and with one another.

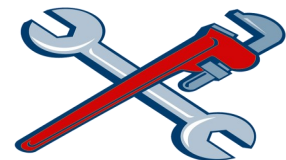

The meeting was called to order and Pastor opened with prayer. January minutes were approved as submitted. A welcome was given to new members Steve Anderson (Facilities), Pat Carrie Smith (Worship) and Julie Jacobson (Secretary).

Treasurer's Report: A report was submitted. Pastor read from the report that the January bank statement reflects Deposits of \$56,756 and withdrawals of \$55,203.

Council Roundtable

Fellowship: A report was submitted. Kathy is working on soup supper sign-ups for both soup and clean-up.

Preschool: A report was submitted.

Personnel: Pastor Scott's evaluation is complete and his new contract is signed.

The rest of the self-evaluations by staff should be in by end of February.

The outside door near the office may be locked and the doorbell used when Amanda is in the building by herself for safety reasons.

Properties: A report was submitted. Steve has looked at the wood and caulking on the outdoor windows. He noted some rotted caulking around the large stained glass windows as well as the interior window wood. He will look at the high end of the windows when there is already a lift at church during a future project. He has noted some siding that looks like it may have some rot. A plan is being considered.

Stewardship: As voted on at the annual meeting, there will be a designated fund created titled "Parking Lot/ Church Maintenance Fund" that anyone can gift money to. This will aid in knowing how much money the church may need to borrow for the parking lot repaving project. June is the best month to sign a contract so that the paving can be accomplished in the summer weather. Don and Steve will work on bids when ready.

WELCA: A report was submitted. There was a decision by the WELCA Board to no longer use the service groups for clean-up after special events, rather there will be a request for volunteers as the need arises.

Worship: A report was submitted. Pat made a motion to replace the lock for the projection closet. Discussion took place. The current key is for a variety of doors and occasionally items have been moved or tampered with. Keys can be distributed to those who need access to the closet. The motion was seconded and all were in favor. Don will purchase the doorknob and 10 keys.

There has been a request to remove the pew in the back of the Narthex. Michael made a motion to donate the pew in 1 month, this was seconded, after 1 abstention the motion passed.

Youth: A report was submitted. There was a request to purchase a used large van. Discussion took place, involving many pros and cons. Don made a motion to table the purchase at this time, this was seconded, after 1 abstention the motion passed. Michael noted that he will miss the next 2 council meetings due to work conflicts.

Pastor's Report: Report was submitted.

Old Business:

- There is no update at this time on the ALC Finance Committee. Don will check in with Lane and John. The next audit is due 2025.

New Business:

We briefly reviewed the annual meeting. Julie will send out the notes to council members as requested.

- Jeaneen presented a request for a change in pay structure for some preschool and nursery staff. After discussion, Don made a motion to increase preschool and nursery staff compensation to reflect similar local job compensation. The amount will be determined in coordination with COLA increases effective May 2024. Vote: 6 yes, 1 oppose, 1 abstention. Motion passed.
 - Pastor Scott introduced a new widget tool that creates a prayer platform on a church website acting as an electronic prayer circle or a wall of prayer. He spoke with the salesperson and got the bid down to a flat fee of \$500 with no additional monthly cost. It was determined this falls under the Outreach budget. Kathy made a motion to purchase this prayer platform ministry tool, this was seconded and all were in favor.
 - Discussion took place regarding our need for a Council President and a Council President-Elect. It was pointed out that the Executive Council cannot conduct any business that requires a vote until we have at least one of the positions filled.
 - Lent Offerings were discussed. Offering opportunities will be at the Lenten service as well as the Soup Supper. Don made a motion to give half of the Lent offerings to a charity in our Anacortes community and the other half to a charity outside of Anacortes after any Soup Supper expenses have been paid. The motion was seconded and all were in favor.
- Michael moved to adjourn the meeting.

Our next regular council meeting will be held March 14 at 6:30 pm. Please have committee reports in to Julie no later than midnight on **Tuesday**, March 12th.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Council Minutes for January 11, 2024

Attendees: John Parker, Pastor Scott, Anita Holzemer, Lane Phelan, Dave Bjornsen, Don Devine, Anne Barry, Kathy Khile, Jeanette Christensen, Jeaneen Brogan, Michael Sullivan, Dave White, and Special Guests Rosemary Walter, Roger Peckman, Julie Jacobson, and Pat Carrie Smith

The meeting was called to order and opened with prayer. December minutes were approved as submitted.

Treasurer's Report: Budget reports and balance sheets were distributed and explained by Lane. All in all member offerings were down for the year, however we were able to meet our expenses. Not everything we had budgeted was spent. Lane will look into finding a new bookkeeper for 2024 since we have been having some issues with the current bookkeeper.

Pastor's Report: Youth Dynamics is asking for monetary support for their fundraising gala. MSP to give a \$500 donation from benevolences. We are looking at offering a Red Cross CPR class in house. Discussion was held as to the possible need of developing an inclement weather policy for the church.

Council Roundtable:

Fellowship: A report was submitted.

Outreach: No report at this time.

Preschool: A report was submitted. The committee will meet next Friday to discuss fundraising to cover the behavior specialist costs. The preschool is considering expanding the 3 year old programming to Fridays.

Personnel: Pastor Scott's evaluation was held today. All other evaluations will be done in the spring.

Properties: A new lock bar was installed in the Fellowship Hall. John will follow up with the locksmith.

Stewardship: We need to look at repaving the parking lot sooner rather than later. It is getting in pretty poor shape. We may need to fundraise \$80-100,000 to cover the cost. Discussion was held.

WELCA: No report at this time.

Worship: A report was submitted.

Youth: No report at this time.

Old Business:

Presentation of proposed 2024 budget: Don passed out the updated budget. A final budget will be emailed out by Saturday to council members. We will be asking members for an increase in giving in order to make this budget. The budget will be available to the congregation for questions and discussion two weeks prior to the annual meeting. MSP to accept the budget methodology with a \$580,000 budget cap.

Slate of candidates prior to Congregational Meeting: We are still missing a candidate for President. Other vacancies still exist for President-Elect, Properties, Outreach, and Josephine Home representatives. A motion will be presented at the annual meeting to allow nominations from the floor for open offices.

Checklist for Congregational Meeting: The budget will be presented to the congregation ahead of the meeting. Q&A sessions will be offered for people with questions about the budget. Amanda will compile committee reports into an annual report. We will need a quorum of 60 people for the meeting.

New Business:

Puget Sound Energy has presented a plan to switch out all of our old fluorescent lighting fixtures to LEDs. With the rebate being offered, our cost would be net zero. PSE will do all the interior work to replace the lights. Timeline will happen within the next 4-6 weeks.

Pat Carrie Smith gave us a report of our 2023 Livestream viewing statistics. Due to low watching numbers on Facebook we have discontinued offering the Livestream on Facebook. Livestream will continue on YouTube and the link will be posted on FB for delayed viewing opportunities.

Kathy Khile is looking for help for Lenten soup suppers. She will email the form out to council and other group members to help recruit volunteers.

Worship Committee is recommending that we change Christmas Eve from 3 services to 2, offering a service at 4 pm and 8 pm. Finding volunteers for 10 pm is difficult, and currently it is the lowest attended. No decisions have been made yet. It will be revisited. On another note, a harp ensemble will be playing special music on Feb 18th. The worship committee is requesting special funds. It was decided to keep the money in the special music line item for bookkeeping purposes. A donation basket may be set out that Sunday morning to help cover the harpist costs.

Our next regular council meeting will be held February 8 at 6:30 pm. Please have committee reports submitted in advance of the meeting.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

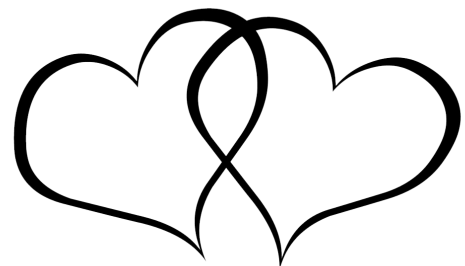

From the Bishop:

During the cold snap in January, I realized that the hummingbird food had frozen again. I went outside to replace it and noticed a hummingbird just sitting, seemingly frozen, perched on one of the little prongs of the feeder. Now, usually the hummingbirds I feed are fierce. They swirl around my head demanding new syrup and for me to move out of their way. They exert a force that, if bigger, would be scary. But this one did nothing as I moved closer.

I stood there. Not sure what to do. Do I shoo it away? Do I simply hope it moves when I reach out? Do I come back later hoping this bird is still alive?

As in most things we do these days, I decided to research online. According to the website *Science*, hummingbirds may appear “frozen” on a feeder, but they’re using torpor to conserve energy. This article urges one to not disturb them as this is a natural behavior and allows them to save their energy.

With this, I decided to wait until the hummingbird flew off before replacing the feeder with fresh syrup (which happened about a half hour later).

So why tell you this small story of hummingbirds and me? I think there is some overlap between energy and torpor and what this all might mean for us as church together.

While not a perfect analogy, sometimes we can act like hummingbirds swirling and swooping, using lots of energy to do things. Sometimes we think that if we aren’t doing activities, or if other people aren’t doing activities, then we are failing as a church. It reminds me of a pastor saying to me at an event for Rostered Ministers, “Bishop, I feel that I have to attend everything that is planned. But, may I ask, is everything planned necessary?”

Perhaps we use energy up when it is not necessary.

Perhaps, like the hummingbird, we also need a time of torpor. Perhaps we need a “time out” time or a reflection time or a meditative time or just a time to inhale and exhale without worrying about the next event or program or activity. As theologian Richard Rohr puts it when describing centering prayer, “Prayer is simply sitting in silence, open to God’s love and your love for God. This prayer is beyond thoughts, emotions, or sensations.”

Dear Beloveds in Christ, Lent is here. As we plan and attend the meaningful worship and fellowship that we all love during the season of Lent, I pray that in worship and in other ways you can find the space and openness to embrace the wonder of the Spirit.

For we can learn from hummingbirds – not that we are to eat one and a half to three times our body weight every day like a hummingbird – but instead, we are called to have a flow between busyness and stillness, action and reflection, hustling and torpor, acts and prayer.

I pray that as we follow Jesus, as we live in Jesus’ love, as we contemplate his words and actions, we may do the same.

In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. Mark 1:35
