Anacortes Lutheran Church - September 2023 Newsletter

Dear Members and Friends of Anacortes Lutheran Church,

We have enjoyed a beautiful summer and are now thinking about 'regular' things starting up again. School, regular meetings, choir, Sunday School, and more! Some of course never took time off during the summer and so may not even notice that life is getting busier. But of course, added to the traditional happenings that we look forward to are some new ones.

Some things that are looking a bit different in September and October: We will be starting off September with worship on the 3rd at 9:30am. We will then be returning to our 10am worship time on September 10th. And entering into October (the 1st)we will be kicking off our 9am Education Hour (for all ages) with a breakfast and then start into classes on the 8th. Sunday School and Confirmation will begin their classes and the adults are invited to gather in the Fellowship Hall for a conversation about ideas of what should be offered for education. I have some ideas, but would also like to hear about what you would like to be learning during this time.

During September and October, I will also be offering opportunities for conversation with those who are interested in becoming members of Anacortes Lutheran. There have been some new faces around on Sundays and I would like to have some conversations with those who are interested in membership. There will be different times offered so that people can work it into their schedules.

We will also be continuing to use the Narrative Lectionary to guide us in our Sunday worship reading selections. We have been using the Revised Common Lectionary that generally gives us 1st and 2nd Readings and a Gospel Reading. The Narrative Lectionary uses Scriptural selections that give us the 'flow of the Story' of God's people in the Bible. We begin in Genesis and travel through the stories of the Jewish Scriptures and then work our way into the Gospels and the Christian epistles (no they are not the spouses of the apostles). It has been created to help us see the overarching Story of God's People and often reminds us that we are a part of that Story today.

There are a few other surprises that are coming up as well, but we can't let all of the rabbits out of the hat at one time! Stay tuned to the weekly emails, the social media posts on Facebook and Instagram, the Scoop, and other announcements happening around campus.

May we walk this path together as God's people at Anacortes Lutheran Church!

We had about 36-40 people for the pool party. 30 of us swam and played in the pool, and after, everyone joined in the BBQ and music.

It was great seeing some of the kids that weren't the strongest swimmers being so encouraged by those who were better swimmers. In my daring attempt to start the fun, I swung out on the rope swing to attempt a back flip, landing in a flawless dive. I managed a slapping backwards belly flop that got peals of laughter and got kids jumping in the pool after me.

At the end of the time in the pool, even those who were nervous about swimming were jumping off the diving board and cheering each other on to push their limits. it was awesome to see everyone come together as a church family and laugh and just enjoy being present with each other.

VBS:

We had 46 participants and 24 Volunteers.

We had a blast putting on this program for the kids, though we may have needed more practice without dances. We fumbled through the first couple days and got a lot of laughs, by the fourth day we were pretty good though. We even performed for the church the following Sunday.

We finished off VBS with water balloons and root beer floats. I learned that our kids have way better pitching arms than I originally gave them credit for. I was soaked in a matter of minutes.

Camping trip:


We had 19 teens camping and 6 chaperones.

During our trip we had planned a hike based on the information given by the app All Trails. It claimed the hike to be "easy/moderate". We learned the hard way that means about a mile of 45-degree switch backs and another mile of a winding trail to a secluded lake front. In the end the lake and picnic were well worth it. Most of the kids and even a couple chaperones were ready to quit and head back but we encouraged them to keep pushing. In the end no one quit, and everyone made it to the lake. We tested our limits and pushed past what most of us thought we could handle. It was a great feeling of accomplishment in the end.

For me personally, this was the first big devotion I planned and got to do start to finish. I was thrilled to bring it to the youth of our congregation and loved how much they listened and participated in the discussions. But more than that we had several of our youth invite friends to this trip. They don't come from religious backgrounds, but they were the most eager to learn and participate. After we got home everyone who was invited to the trip asked to be included in our youth emails and really wanted to become part of our church family. That trip doubled our middle school youth numbers and helped build bonds between the high school and middle school groups.

Since this trip I have gotten several texts and emails from parents thanking us and sharing their appreciation and the immediate affect we had on the kids' daily lives. They are eager to volunteer and encourage more activities like this. I love that we made such an impact with one event.

CHOIR IS STARTING UP! COME JOIN US!


Wednesdays at 6:30 pm

ALC COUNCIL MINUTES - AUGUST 10, 2023

Attendees: John Parker, Pastor Scott, Anita Holzemer, Lane Phelan, Don Devine, Dave Bjornsen, Anne Barry, Dave White, Jeanette Christensen, Special Guests: Maggie Santos, Heather Harrington, and Pat Carrie Smith

The meeting was called to order and opened with prayer. June minutes were approved as submitted.

Special Guest Report: Maggie Santos attended representing the preschool. The school is full for the fall. School begins Sept 13 with parent orientation on Sept 8. One of the teachers was overpaid on her last check. Maggie will follow-up with Rachel to resolve this. Don has removed the old playground equipment. The new replacement equipment for the 3 yr olds has been shipped. The preschool has investigated new equipment for children that would work both for the preschool and the church youth. MSP to purchase the new equipment as proposed. **ACTION ITEMS:** (1) A finance group needs to be established to discuss financial/payroll procedures for the preschool, and (2) a group needs to meet to discuss funding source options to pay for the new playground equipment.

Treasurer's Report: Lane went over the current budget status. July giving was right on track. We continue to take in more than what we are spending. That is great news. The report can be confusing to read at times. Lane will meet with Don soon about tweaking the report format going forward.

Council Roundtable:

Education: Heather is the new chair. She will work with her committee to look for a new Sunday School curriculum. She is looking to recruit teachers. Rally Day is tentatively scheduled for the first Sunday in October with a breakfast. Class kick-off will be the second Sunday in October.

Fellowship: Report was submitted. She needs volunteers. Music jam nights will begin again next week.

Outreach: Report was submitted. Dave suggested that we start a childcare program for some of our young families utilizing adult and youth volunteers. This would be offered twice a month.

Preschool: Many thanks to Maggie for her work with our preschool. The preschool committee will meet later in September to discuss state licensure.

Property: Island Hospital Billing department is currently using the old Sleep Center clinic. Employees are using our parking lot for about three months until their offices at the hospital are repaired. If a large event is happening at the church, they have agreed to move the cars. Nursery lights have been replaced with LED lights. It was suggested we phase out all the fluorescent lights in the church and replace them with LEDs as they need replacing. Church work party will be scheduled for Sept 2. We hope to begin first Saturday monthly work party days again soon.

Stewardship: Financial review was conducted. The audit committee concluded the procedures we currently have in place are working well. They did suggest we look at the amount we have in our checking account and look at investing in a higher interest product.

WELCA: WELCA picnic luncheon will be Aug 29. Sewing continues. Thanks to the congregation for all of the donations of blankets, school supplies, etc. Thank you to the ushers that served at the funeral.

Worship: Report was submitted. Passing of the Peace will start happening on the first Sunday of the month. A replacement chair has been ordered for the chair lift. God's Work, Our Hands will be highlighted on Sept 10. Sunday School will resume on Oct 1.

President's Report: Report was submitted.

Pastor's Report: Report was submitted. One additional item to add was regarding re-activating the Care Team. It is the hope to reestablish visitation of some of our shut-ins. Perhaps this would include use of Bill LeDuc and Linda Myllo who have already been trained as chaplains through Josephine. Volunteers are needed. Pastor will present the need on Sept 10 at the "God's Work, Our Hands" program kick-off.

Old Business:

John reported on open items still needing action.

Fire alarm inspection status: Fire Chief is our new monitoring company. John is working on contacting them for follow-up.

COVID period Employee Retention Credit (ERC) – John has contacted Ministry Works. We are still waiting to hear back from the IRS before potentially receiving our credit.

ELCA NW Synod grant request: We received grant approval for money to help with our Youth Ministry expenses. No money has come through yet, but is expected. Pr Scott will follow up.

Oyster Run breakfast: Pastor will head up this project. It will take volunteers from across the church. Breakfast burritos might be easier to manage over pancakes.

New Business:

Education Chairperson nomination/vote: Heather Harrington has stepped forward to take over as Education Chair. She was unanimously approved and appointed as the new chair. She will be voted on at the annual meeting.

Recruitment and nominations for council positions: Individual contacts are needed. All council members are encouraged to reach out to members they feel might be good prospects. Please feel free to share names with Pastor Scott so he can also reach out.

Our next regular council meeting will be held September 14 at 6:30 pm. Please have committee reports in to Anita no later than noon on September 13th.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

FROM BISHOP SHELLEY BRYAN WEE -The~Spirit~ September 2023

I went to the musical 1776 a few nights ago where I learned some new things about how the Declaration of Independence came to be written. As I watched, I felt proud to be an American – to be part of a group of people who wanted freedom from tyranny, freedom to vote, freedom from an empire far away.

There were also moments in this play when I was horrified at some decisions made. At the last minute, the clause to abolish slavery was removed so that all of the representatives would sign the document. The most powerful song in the musical, Molasses to Rum, reminds the audience how all the colonies were complicit in the selling of humans – not just the south. As an American, I hold two realities. First, I rejoice in the wonder and aspiration of the United States of America. I am grateful for this country and I love what it is striving to be. At its best, it is a country where freedom and liberty are supreme. It is a place where care is given to those arriving on its shores. It is a place where people can freely go to church and other places of worship (or not go at all). In short, the United States is a promise of what can be.

At the same time, I hold the truth of this country's sins. Enslaved men built the White House, the U.S. Capitol building, and others. Homes of former presidents including George Washington's Mount Vernon and James Madison's Montpelier were built by men "owned" by them. The land that we in the Northwest Washington Synod are living on was once land that belonged to Samish and Duwamish, Lummi, and Muckleshoot and many others. Japanese people were unjustly imprisoned during World War II. Sundown laws and redlining laws were written throughout this country. As a white woman, I know that I could not vote until 1919. For women of color, the right to vote did not come until later. People who are part of the LGBTQIA+ communities have been harassed and discriminated against, beaten up and killed in this country. And discriminatory practices and violence continue to this day. In short, the systems in this country have violated and harmed people since its inception.

This is what it means to be an American: to vote, to engage in civic society, to appreciate this country, to grieve past and present sins, and to truthfully stand up and speak when it falls short of its ideals.

But what about those of us who are American and also Christian? Unequivocally it means that as much as one might love this country, this is not where our ultimate allegiance lies. For we are part of the body of Christ that extends beyond the borders of any country. As Lutheran Christians, we know that we are named, chosen, and called by God through Jesus. We hold deeply the joy that we are freed from sin, and, because of this, we are called into radical love, acceptance, and welcome – far beyond being a citizen of any country. We are freed to live beyond racism, injustice, and bigotry. Martin Luther wrote that freedom is a gift from God, not just for our sake, or our country's sake, but for the sake of the world.

Tragically, there are those who want to distort this freedom. To somehow merge Christian and American identities. Rather than freedom, conflating religious authority with political authority leads to tyranny and marginalization - especially of minority groups. Christian Nationalism is neither patriotic nor is it faithful. You do not have to be Christian to be a "true" American. And you do not have to be American to be Christian. At its heart, it is idolatrous. As the First Commandment states, "You shall have no other gods." Together, as faithful Christians, let us live into Jesus' words –into radical love, acceptance and welcome. Let us speak truth to power and stand with those without power. Let us follow Jesus who commands us to love everyone as our brothers and sisters and siblings including our fellow citizens, those of other belief systems, and those of other nations.

Together, as faithful Christians, let us stand up and speak out against Christian Nationalism and any system that marginalizes, harms, and subjugates another. As Jesus announces in the gospel of Luke, 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because God has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. God has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor.'

For freedom Christ has set us free. May we live and dance and revel in the freedom of Christ.
